Year 1

Year 2

Year 2 have had a busy and exciting few weeks! In English, the children have been retelling the story of *Tad*, linking to our current topic "If you go down to the woods today. They used rich vocabulary and storytelling skills to bring the tale to life. In Art, the children have had lots of fun exploring clay, creating their own imaginative models inspired by the work of Rachel Whiteread. We also enjoyed a fantastic residential trip to Beau Manor, where the children made lifelong memories. It was wonderful to see them so happy, enthusiastic, and independent—the experience has clearly boosted their confidence.







Year 3

This term has been a busy one, we have learnt about where our food comes from, fair trade and how to reduce our carbon footprints in our topic From Field to Fork. We then started our new topic on the Romans, learning about the expansion of the Roman Empire to Britain, life as a Celt and the lasting impact of the Romans on Leicester. We have become designers in art, carried out several investigations in Science, learnt how to play Badminton and have even started to learn our songs for Vocal Ease! Our latest adventure in Year three has been the Easter Experience at St John the Baptist Church. The children visited six stations of the Easter story, starting with Palm Sunday all the way through to the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. They had interactive sessions at each of the stations led by different members of the church. Pupils showed not only their understanding of the Easter story but also their ability to think deeply about this special time of year for Christians. We have been using this knowledge to create mini-plays for our Easter activity. Well done for another brilliant term.... We cannot wait to continue our year three journey next term!





Year 4

This half-term, Year 4 completed Topic 4, *Explosive Planet Earth*, which they really enjoyed. They have now moved on to a new geography topic, *Oceans, Seas and Rivers*, using their geographical skills to explore water systems around the world. A highlight of the term was the collaborative event at the leisure centre, where Year 4 children learned valuable life skills alongside their peers from other local schools. They explored important topics such as CPR, bandaging, asthma awareness, making 999 calls, the recovery position, choking response and water safety. It was a wonderful hands-on learning experience and we were so proud of how engaged and enthusiastic the children were. Well done Year 4!




Year 5

Uniform

- Navy cardigan or jumper with the school logo

Parking

Please remember to park only in legal parking spots and to respect and adhere to all posted no-parking zones. Your cooperation in maintaining a safe environment around our school is greatly appreciated. Let us work together to ensure the safety of all our students and families.



We would kindly like to remind everyone to drive and park safely and considerately when dropping off or picking up children from school. Unfortunately, we have seen and heard reports of some dangerous and inconsiderate parking and manoeuvres.

The safety of our children is always our top priority, so please ensure you are parking appropriately and driving with care around the school.

How Can You Help?

- Park further away and walk to school
- Keep your speed down
- Park in a safe place following the Highway Code.
- Do not park on pavements
- Turn your engine off as soon as you have parked
- Keep the school gates clear at all times stopping here, even to drop off your child for a short period of time, is dangerous
- Do not enter the school car park unless authorised to do so
- Do not block local residents' drives
- Leave the middle of the road free, with enough room for other road users to easily pass through
- Leave enough room for emergency vehicles to easily pass through
- Make sure your child leaves and enters your vehicle safely to and from the pavement
- Check for pedestrians and cyclists before opening a car door
- Take care when reversing
- Remember it only takes one vehicle to be parked inconsiderately for there to be an impact on accessibility to emergency services or others. Do not be that one.

Nut and Egg-Free School


